



180° SOUTH - Friday 5:30 Monterey Bay Aquarium Auditorium

180° SOUTH is the story of one of the most unique and prolific environmentalists of our time Yvon Chouinard. Rather than re-living Yvon's story through old photos and his life's work with pie charts, *180° SOUTH* weaves Chouinard's tale through a modern day expedition. This expedition was inspired by the rumor of a legendary trip in 1968 and the proof that came with it when the lost cans of film that documented the trip were recently discovered. The old footage captures Chouinard and best friend Doug Tompkins in 1968 as they explore untouched mountain ranges and un-surfed coastline on a 5000 mile expedition from California to deep Patagonia. For the two men, the original '68 adventure still stands as "the trip of our lives."

Hurricane on the Bayou - Sunday 11:00am - 12:30, 5:15pm 6:15 IMAX

Journey deep into the soul-stirring heart of Louisiana – before, during and after the unprecedented devastation of Hurricane Katrina. Unfolding against the poignant backdrop of the most costly natural disaster in America's history, we follow a group of four New Orleans musicians: Legendary singer, songwriter, pianist, producer Allen Toussaint, Cajun blues guitarist and wetlands activist Tab Benoit, fiddling prodigy Amanda Shaw, and zydeco accordion master Chubby Carrier. Through their eyes, we witness the tragedy the city faced during Katrina.

**Mediterraneo – L'ultima Arca - Thursday 3:30pm Maritime Museum
(Mediterranean – The Last Ark)**

The Mediterranean Sea has a very ancient history: Evidenced by the marine fossils still sheltered into the heart of the Alps once part of the Thetis, the primeval Ocean that separated the two early continents on our Planet, today's Mediterranean is a small isolated sea, connected to the Atlantic and the whole ocean system through the thin Strait of Gibraltar. Through an ideal journey across the Mediterranean, we will narrate its story and meet its protagonists: Some of them are threatened by extinction, others gained their right to survival. Now more than ever, this little sea needs attention and awareness.

**Palme A Mare - Thursday 3:30pm Maritime Museum
(Palms Adrift)**

Isola delle Femmine, Women's Island, is home to one of the most ancient communities of Sicilian fishermen. This seaside village, located west of Palermo (Sicily's main city), still maintains some old fishery traditions. During the pruning season, palm branches cut from the trees that decorate the sea-front promenade are gathered by fishermen to be shaped into floating rafts. It's a simple and smart fishing tool, deriving from the attentive observation of sailors ever since: Any piece of wood, any part of a wreck at sea produces a shade that is much sought-after by fishes. This man-made raft, called *Cannizzo*, attracts large schools of fish into the trap of its shade.

Ocean Men - Saturday 11:00am, 2:30 pm, 6:15pm IMAX

Oceanmen takes you into the world of these two awe-inspiring freedivers through the use of breathtaking underwater photography, enchanting music, and insightful animation. Marvelous graphics escort you on a journey through the divers bodies and show the original diving reflex, which is carried by sea mammals and humans alike. Ultimately, the movie allows a glimpse into the souls of these extraordinary men with the hope of transferring the magic of freediving directly to the audience.

**La Pesca, C'era Una Volta - Thursday 3:30pm Maritime Museum
(Once Upon A Time... A Fisherman)**

Technology is leaving deeper and deeper its mark on the fishing industry. This rule does not apply to most of the fishing villages of Sicily. Here, in the heart of the Mediterranean Sea, one can still observe gestures and traditions that have been living on for centuries. On some of Sicily's tiny islands, peasants still gather the wood left by the sea on the beach: Trees are a rare and precious heritage on an island. Some fishermen still intertwine their bow-net out of thin flexible twigs to catch lobsters. Here, one can still grasp secrets from the last shipwrights, or live a night at sea on a small fishing boat, remembering the time when cars were the only means of propulsion and a piece of bread and a bunch of grapes made up a dinner.

Sharkwater - Saturday 12:00am IMAX

Driven by passion fed from a lifelong fascination with sharks, Stewart debunks historical stereotypes and media depictions of sharks as bloodthirsty, man-eating monsters and reveals the reality of sharks as pillars in the evolution of the seas. Through it all, Stewart discovers these magnificent creatures have gone from predator to prey, and how despite surviving the earth's history of mass extinctions, they could easily be wiped out within a few years due to human greed.

FUEL is a comprehensive and entertaining look at energy in America: A history of where we have been, our present predicament and a solution to our dependence on foreign oil.
